Roundtable 2: The politics of academic practice in planning: a discussion

Planners' Network UK was founded in 2006 to support critical thinking about the current state of planning in the UK. The network is intended to appeal to a broad range of academics, practitioners and activists interested in rearticulating the progressive purpose of planning. It hopes to establish the basis for connecting all those concerned about the current climate of debate. So far, however, membership remains rooted in the universities and the network has proven difficult to mobilise. This is perhaps unsurprising amidst the ongoing neoliberalisation of university life where academic practice is becoming increasingly remote from both the political realities of planning practice and the activist origins from which the discipline grew. How Thomas and others have sought to bring some of these questions out into the open before (see Campbell et al 2005), this session comprising a short roundtable, with plenty of scope for discussion, hopes to open a space in the conference to further air such concerns. The session aims to explore the nature of academic responsibility towards the worlds of practice and the wider public, to interrogate the roles of planning academics in relation to activism, public political engagement and intellectual debate, and policy development.
