Recent grant success

Florence Elliott Travel Award

Dr Mark Linden received a Florence Elliott travel award to visit the University of British Columbia in May 2014. Mark will be working in collaboration with Professor Ruth Grunau on an ongoing prospective longitudinal cohort study of neonatal pain, brain development and neurodevelopment in children born very preterm.

Dr Maria Lohan was successful in obtaining \$5000 funding through an International Research Colloquium Award at the Peter Wall Institute for Advanced studies, University of British Columbia, to showcase innovative research generated within the past year.

NIHR Public Health Research Award and Invited Washington DC Visit

NIHR Public Health Research Award

Congratulations to Dr Maria Lohan, Dr Áine Aventin, Dr Mark Linden, Dr Peter O'Halloran and Dr Carmel Kelly on receiving funding from the NIHR Public Health Research (PHR) Programme looking at the effectiveness of an intervention called 'If I Were Jack'. The intervention is aimed to reduce unintended teenage pregnancies and is especially targeted to include boys. As the UK has the

highest rate of teenage pregnancies in Western Europe, and the second highest in the Western World, it is vital that effective and well-timed interventions are delivered to improve sexual health knowledge and behaviour.

Dr Lohan states that "If the intervention is found to be both acceptable and effective, it has the potential to benefit all pupils aged 14-16 in Northern Ireland and the rest of the UK".



Dr Maria Lohan and Dr Áine Aventin had the honour of being invited to Washington DC on Wednesday 16 April to present their research to the National Campaign for Unplanned Pregnancy. The title of the talk was: "If I were Jack" An interactive film-based approach to addressing teenage men and unintended pregnancy.

The All Ireland Institute of Hospice Palliative Care (AIHPC) announced this month a significant expansion of its consortium membership, increasing from 12 to 17 partners. Queen's University Belfast was a founding partner of the Institute, with the School of Nursing and Midwifery taking the lead for the University.

Minister Coveney said: "It is a pleasure to formally recognise the enlarged consortium of partners working together to ultimately benefit patients and their families. The Institute is playing a key role – informing improvement, engaging with communities, facilitating change and leading developments."
