The Institute welcomes papers on aspects, both domestically and globally, of conflict transformation as well as on peace, security and justice. It particularly welcomes papers informed by perspectives from across different disciplines and work which is comparative in scope. These comparisons may be across space and/or through time. Also, we would like to encourage early career researchers (e.g. PhD students; MA's, who submitted an excellent dissertation) to send their papers, too.

All papers are refereed and we aim to return comments to the author within 4-6 weeks of submission. Papers are accepted on the understanding that they represent the views of the author and not those of the Institute itself. We strongly encourage submission by new, emerging and established scholars.

Working papers accepted for the series will be given an **ISSN number** and appear on the Institute website.

How to Submit a Working Paper

Papers for consideration for inclusion in the series should be sent to **Working Paper Coordinator, Dr Eva Urban-Devereux** at e.urban-devereux@qub.ac.uk.

The title page of your paper will include your departmental and institutional affiliation, postal address and email, so please ensure you provide this information when you submit.

Papers should be no longer than 8,000 words, excluding references, and must include a 100 word abstract and up to five keywords.

Style Guide

All text, including references and endnotes should be double-spaced in Calibri 12pt font.

Harvard style for in-text references but with a colon rather than a 'p' after the date of publication and before the page numbers, e.g.

In-text reference

1. Jackson (2010) argues that...
2. 'Quotation...' (Jackson 2010: 76)

Notes and references should be entered manually and appear at the end of the text. Please use endnotes sparingly.

References should appear in the following format:
