WORKSHOPS

PEER MENTORING

The Scheme has grown significantly over the years. Currently, in 2018/19, there are:

- 650 subject-based, trained, voluntary peer mentors, including approximately 80 voluntary lead mentors;
- 38 Peer Mentoring Academic Co-ordinators who oversee Peer Mentoring within their Schools;
- 35 mentoring schemes aimed at supporting transition and providing varying degrees of academic support;
- 2 peer-assisted learning schemes;
- 1 placement ambassador scheme;
- 1 international scheme.
