# MS 40 Green Manuscripts

#### About the collection:

MS 40 consists of a small collection of articles, talks, and papers written and delivered by economic historian Professor Edward Rodney Richey Green (1920-1981). Professor E.R.R. Green was a Senior Lecturer in History at Manchester University from 1954-1970 and held the post of Director of the Institute of Irish Studies at Queen's University Belfast from 1970-1981. Pamphlets and re-printed articles published by Green form the bulk of this collection, alongside typescripts of other unpublished material. Of particular note are a series of papers delivered by Green and others at a public lecture series on 'Ulstermen in American Business', organised by the Ulster-Scot Historical Foundation in [1972?]. Also included are typescripts of radio lectures and talks by Green during the 1960s and 1970s, many as part of the Thomas Davis Lectures series broadcast by RTE (Radio Telefis Éireann). Correspondence between RTE and Green detailing the conditions of some of the broadcasts is also contained.

Pamphlet by Green, E.R.R., 'Irish Linen Halls' (Belfast: H.R. Carter Publications Ltd., 1951), 1-8 pp. Thin pamphlet on the history and building of Linen Halls throughout Ireland. Contains text and images on Linen Halls in Dublin, Banbridge, Belfast, Armagh, and Newry. Thin pamphlet, 249mm x 188mm.

#### MS 40/5 Economic History

Reprinted article by Green, E.R.R., 'Economic History' from *Belfast In Its Regional Setting: a scientific survey* (Belfast: British Association, 1952), 119-126 pp. The article looks at the economic history of Northern Ireland and Ulster from the 17<sup>th</sup> century onwards. Loose pages stapled together, 24mm x 17mm.

#### MS 40/6 Industrial Archaeology

Reprinted article by Green, E.R.R., 'Industrial Archaeology' from *Antiquity*, Volume XXXIV, 1960, 43-50 pp. Thin pamphlet, 248mm x 184mm. Article published by Green while a lecturer at Manchester University. Summarises the work of a one-day conference (12 December 1959) held on the subject and following the formation of a Research Committee on Industrial Archaeology by the Council for British Archaeology. Green also writes on the 'potential and necessary developments in this new field of archaeology'.

# MS 40/7 On Open Town-Fields

Reprinted article by Green, E.R.R., 'On open-town fields' from *The Agricultural History Review*, Volume IX, Part II (1961), 84-88 pp. Green/black cover. Green discusses the work of agriculturalist Charles Varley, or Varlo (c. 1725-1795) and includes an extract of his work. Varley began life as a farm labourer in England and Scotland, before moving to Ireland in 1748 to work 'first as a steward to the bishop of Elphin and then as an instructor in flax-growing for the Linen Board'. Thin pamphlet, 248mm x 187mm.

# MS 40/8 Patron and Architect: An example of relations in the late 18th Century

Reprinted article by Green, E.R.R. and E.M. Jope, 'Patron and Architect: an example of relations in the late 18<sup>th</sup> Century' from the *Ulster Journal of Archaeology*, Vol. 25-25 (1961-2), 145-151 pp. Stapled pages, 245mm x 185mm. This article analyses a 'selection of letters between the second Marquis of Downshire and his overseers or agents, and the architect who provided his designs, Robert Furze Brettingham' that 'illustrate the interplay between the architect's conception and that of his patron among the Irish nobility of the late 18<sup>th</sup> century'. Contains photos and designs of Lord Downshire's House. Also attached is an article by D.M. Waterman, 'The Building of Ballykilbeg House, Co. Down, 1790-2', 152-155 pp. Also 'Reviews and notices of publications', 155-156 pp.

Transcript of radio discussion on Industrial Archaeology between E.R.R. Green, Kenneth Hudson and Charles Thomas. Introduced by John Irving. #### MS 40/10 The Scotch-Irish and Ulster

E. Montgomery, 'The Scotch-Irish in Ulster' (Belfast: Ulster-Scot Historical Society, 1965). Traces the history of the Scotch-Irish in Ulster and covers other wider areas, including the influence of the Scotch-Irish in America and US Presidents of Scotch-Irish origin. Mixture of text and images. Pamphlet, 204mm x 128mm.

#### MS 40/11 Charles James Kickham and John O'Leary

Typescript of 'Thomas Davis Lecture: No. 6. Kickham and O'Leary' by Green, E.R.R. Broadcast by RTE on 3<sup>rd</sup> December 1967, 9.30-10.00 p.m. The lecture covers the lives of Charles J. Kickham (1828-1882) and John O'Leary (1830-1907), both prominent Irish literary figures involved in the Fenian movement throughout the 19<sup>th</sup> century. Also included is a letter sent from RTE to E.R.R. Green detailing the conditions of the broadcast. Blue and white, loose pages, 1-15 pp. All held in a brown folder labelled 'Charles J. Typescript of 'Thomas Davis Lecture: No. 8. The Fenians Abroad' by Green, E.R.R. Broadcast by RTE on 6<sup>th</sup> December 1970, 10.40-11.10 p.m. This lecture discusses the Fenian societies abroad, with particular emphasis on the United States. Also included is a letter sent from RTE to E.R.R. Green detailing the conditions of the broadcast. Stapled pages, 1-11 pp., printed on the reverse side of notes relating to the Ulster Scot Historical Society and the Ulster Folk and Transport Museum. # MS 40/16 The South

Typescript of an article, 'The South', submitted to Orbis Publishing in 1972 by Green, E.R.R, 1-16 pp. Also attached is a letter addressed to Green dated 31<sup>st</sup> May 1972, two months before it was submitted. The letter is from the Editor at Orbis Publishing inviting Green to submit an article for inclusion in 'a multi-volume illustrated history of the American peoples'. Also included is a note sent to Horton from Green upon submission of the article, dated 26<sup>th</sup> July 1972. All held in brown folder labelled 'The South', 351mm x 242mm.

# MS 40/19 Industrial Decline in the 19th Century

Typescript of paper by Green, E.R.R. on 'Industrial Decline in the Nineteenth Century' (n.d.), 1-10 pp. This paper analyses Irish industry throughout the 19<sup>th</sup> Century with emphasis on the impact of the Act of Union, 1800. Contains two typescripts of the paper that are both heavily annotated. Draft copies of pages 7, 9, and 10 are also included. Many pages are printed on the reverse of typescripts of a paper on 'Twentieth-Century Agriculture'. All held in brown folder labelled 'Industrial Decline in the 19<sup>th</sup> Century', 351mm x 242mm.

#### MS 40/21 Note sent to E.R.R. Green in 1972

A loose letter sent on 3<sup>rd</sup> November 1972 to Green at Queen's University Belfast. Relating to an 'Article on MacNeill', the short note refers to the authors to be credited for the article concerned, L.D.G. Collen and R.J.H. Corbett. The sender is unknown, but it was presumably sent by L.D.G. Collen. It is stamped with an address of Garrivhan, Stepaside, Sandyford, Co. Dublin.
