Deusto is a beautiful university in a beautiful city – I felt welcome right away especially thanks to the wine and cheese welcome party! I picked courses that I felt would help me get the most out of my time there.

These included several business classes, Spanish lessons and a class on Basque culture and language. Classes were small and informal, with more focus on group work and continual improvement rather than exams! The Erasmus community in Bilbao is unlike any other! "1. Time management. Amsterdam is a world-leading university – I knew I would have to meet the academic challenges and balance that with the excitement of being in a new city and juggling a couple of hospitality
jobs, I very quickly learnt how to schedule myself to effectively manage my time, ensuring I kept on top of my academic performance."

"2. The value of community. Moving to new city in a new country can be quite overwhelming. It's important to put yourself out there and make as many friends as you can. You'll very quickly find that you make lasting friendships with a range of people from across the world."

"3. Learn the language. English tends to be the language in Europe adopted by international students, but I would recommend however that you make an effort to learn some conversational terms in the language of the country you live in. This will really open you up to locals and enable you to learn more about the culture you're immersed in." "4. Ride a bike. This one may be more applicable to Amsterdam than other cities. Riding a bike however not only enables you to be independent and free to move on your own terms, it's also great for exercise, your mental well-being, and your bank account."

"5. Stay open. Try new things. Immersing yourself into a different culture allows you to try your hand at things you may never have done before. Take this as an opportunity to learn about different ways of living, whether that's sports, food, academia, social events etc."
