- Delighted to welcome the Leader of His Majesty's Opposition,
 - Sir Keir Starmer,
 - to the Great Hall here at Queen's University Belfast.
- His visit is timely as we are in the midst of significant political challenges here in NI,
 - so we privileged that he has chosen Queen's as a venue to deliver such an important speech,
- We could not wish for a more fitting setting. On the walls of this
 room hang portraits of many leading Queen's alumni, who played
 a significant role in the peace process,
 - o the Late Professor Lord David Trimble,
 - o former President of Ireland Professor Mary McAleese,
 - o the late Baroness May Blood
 - and of course our former Chancellor, Senator George J
 Mitchell.
- We are fast approaching the 25th anniversary of the Belfast/Good
 Friday Agreement.
- Queen's will mark this important milestone with a major international conference over three days in April.

- A conference that will not only look back but also look forward envisioning the future of opportunity for NI.
- We hope, Keir, that you will be able to join us on that occasion
- Keir is no stranger to this part of the world
 - Indeed, his connection to the peace process in Northern
 Ireland predates his political career.
 - It goes back to the early days of police service reform at the outset of the Agreement implementation.
- Shortly after he was appointed a Queen's Counsel in 2002, Keir served as a human rights adviser to the Northern Ireland
 Policing Board
 - The Board was formed to oversee the newly created Police
 Service of Northern Ireland.
 - In that role many policing board members benefitted from Keir's wisdom and advice.
 - These members came from all political parties many of whom went on to Ministerial and party leadership roles.
- Following his impressive career as a barrister, he was Director of
 Public Prosecutions from 2008 to 2013

- Dealing effectively with many high-profile issues and cases during his tenure.
- He also introduced range of **new processes to** improve the legal system
- he was knighted in 2014 for his services to law and criminal justice.
- After stepping down as DPP, he entered Parliament as MP for Holburn and St Pancras in 2014.
- He has held a number of posts within the shadow cabinet
 - notably the Shadow Secretary of State for the Exiting of the European Union, an issue that continues to have a profound impact here in Northern Ireland.
- The lack of agreement on the protocol issues, and the lack of a NI Executive and Assembly is having a profound impact on our community on issues ranging from Health to Higher Education.
- We urgently need an agreement on the outstanding issues and the restoration of the Belfast/Good Friday Agreement institutions

- In the **Higher Education** sector here in Northern Ireland, we are particularly concerned about the **challenges facing our students**
- The current arrangement creates significant inequality for access to HE, where our young people are seriously disadvantaged in local provision and access compared to England.
- We still **lose 30% of our young** people to GB, most do not return.
- This fuels a shortage of skilled graduates to meet the needs of our growing economy,
 - and risks economic growth stalling at a time when we have invested in innovation with our City deal programme.
- Despite the pressing need to invest,
 - o an investment that delivers enormous return,
 - o in Queen's case an 8.2:1 benefit to cost ratio
 - the sector is facing funding cuts.
- Cuts at a time when we need to find an extra 5,000 university
 places before the end of this decade, to meet increasing

demographic demands from growth in the population of 18 year olds

- Not to expand provision can only create further disadvantage and disillusionment over the next few years.
- So failure to invest in our young people will have a deep socioeconomic impact which affects our ability to attract major employers and investors to this great part of the world.
- Clearly the issue at the top of the political agenda is a restored NI
 Executive.
- In the room today are many political leaders, I
- hope that the discussions we have this morning can serve to
 advance progress as you work together to find solutions
- Our community in NI urgently needs your leadership.
