






Undergraduate Academic Modules

- 3 Modules a semester
 - Each module is typically equally weighted
 - Combines a range of teaching delivery types
 - Assessed through a balance of continuous assessment and examination
 - Include weekly private study not timetabled
 - Each module will have its own online Canvas module site

Undergraduate Lectures – structure

 Typically 50 minute blocks of one, two or three hours each week for 11 weeks



- Begins 5 minutes past the hour and ends 5 minutes to the hour
- On campus unless stated otherwise in the module handbook or module canvas site
- Two or three hour lectures will include one or two breaks
- Attendance is monitored (formally and informally)



Lectures – your role



- Prepare
 - https://www.qub.ac.uk/student-blog/studying-courses/make-mostof-lectures.html
 - Review PPT or recommended reading in advance of class
 - 1 hour lecture : 5 hours independent study
- Listen, rather than write down everything
- Ask questions (before, during and after) in person, by email or via MS Teams
- Review before next lecture



Tutorials, Seminars and Workshops – structure

- Typically smaller group teaching depending on subject
 - May or may not be taken by module lecturer
- Compulsory and attendance monitored
 - Often will not start until week 2
- On campus unless stated otherwise in the module handbook or module canvas site
- Typically require student participation
 - Pre prepared tutorial questions
 - Group discussion
 - Views on readings





Tutorials ... – your role

- Prepare
 - Introduce yourself before first class
 - Read material beforehand and complete given tasks
- During
 - Get there early and say hello to tutorial leader
 - Participate in discussions, tutorials are not assessed unless informed by tutorial lead
 - Ask questions
- After
 - Review answers and reading





Assessment

- Unique to each module
 - Consult the module handbook or canvas module
 - Can be individual or group based
 - Often a combination of two or three of :
 - Class tests
 - Reflective writing
 - Essays
 - Reports
 - Practical's
 - Presentations
 - Examinations (generally end of semester)





Assessment – your role

- Don't panic
 - All assessment seems more difficult than it is on first view
 - You will often know the assessment before you have covered the material in class
- Plan
 - What are the deadlines
 - Avoid late penalties
 - Get to know your group
 - Raise issues, worries, concerns as soon as they arise
- Submit
 - Online via Canvas assessment submission tool





Assessment excluding examinations – your role

- Bibliographic citation and referencing
 - Avoid plagiarism
 - ensure your submissions are your own work
 - Cite all sources
 - Different style for each discipline
 - Consult with module handbook or assessment outline
 - Use the resources

Examinations

- Typically 2 or 3 hours duration
- May include
 - MCQ's
 - Short answer
 - Essay style questions
 - Problem solving exercises

 - No material allowed in exam
 - No electronic devices allowed including watches
