MA Conflict Transformation and Social Justice

Duration: One year full-time or two years part-time

About the Institute

The Institute is **distinctive internationally in linking peace-making with social transformation.** It gives attention to the need for governance reform of state institutions alongside cultural and social processes for healing in society.

Striving to create dialogue within which all voices can be heard and to underpin the pursuit of peace through world class research, the Institute connects the perspectives of all those who seek to contribute to conflict transformation and social justice – from the insights of world leading researchers to the experience of practitioners, policy makers, politicians and activists.

Aims of the Programme

This MA provides students with the opportunity to undertake study across the Faculty of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences and beyond, and thus benefit from the enriched interdisciplinary learning environment and expertise of award winning academic staff.

Students will engage with core theories, concepts, issues and debates within conflict transformation and social justice related to the nature and character of conflict, examples of global conflicts, modes and forms of conflict transformation and legal and human rights.

This is a unique and innovative interdisciplinary programme, taught through subject areas that include law, anthropology, English, history, philosophy, politics, psychology, sociology and the creative arts. Module choice within the programme will permit you to build your own personalised portfolio of knowledge and learning within the area of conflict transformation and social justice. You will be taught by academics and practitioners whose expertise is both national and global and who offer research-led teaching in areas of conflict such as South/ Southeast Asia, the Middle East, Southern Europe, South America and Northern Ireland.

Modules are organise into three main themes of concentration:

Stream 1: Conflict and Transformation

Stream 2: Asserting Social Justice, Inclusion and Rights

Stream 3: Religion, Society, Peace-building and Conflict



Benefits of the Programme

Students are required to complete **THREE** compulsory taught modules; *Global Concepts* and Practices of Conflict Transformation and Social Justice (20 CATS), Conducting Research in Conflict Transformation and Social Justice (20 CATS), Making Knowledge Work (20 CATS) and the triple-weighted dissertation (60 CATS points).

In addition to the compulsory modules, students take 60 CATS points of optional modules from existing programmes delivered by the following Schools: Arts, English and Languages; Law; History, Anthropology, Politics and Philosophy; Psychology and Social Sciences, Education and Social Work.

Within each stream students must take modules from at least two Schools. Students may take no more than 40 CATS worth of optional modules from any one School.

The taught modules are delivered during two 12 week semesters.

Elective modules include:

Freedom of Assembly and the Right to Protest: Democracy, Transition and Social Justice (The Senator George J. Mitchell Institute for Global Peace, Security and Justice)

Crime, Justice & Society (Law)

Human Rights in Practice (Law)

Global Terrorism (History, Anthropology, Politics and Philosophy)

Political Cinema: Conflict and Form (Creative Arts)

Theoretical Perspectives and Focal Issues in Political Psychology (Psychology)

Counter-terrorism and Human Rights (Law)

War of Gods: Religion and Identity in Historical Perspective (History, Anthropology, Politics and Philosophy)

Religion and Peacebuilding (The Senator George J. Mitchell Institute for Global Peace, Security and Justice)

Critical Approaches to Human Geography (Geography, Archaeology and Paleoecology)

This will enhance employability, and develop independent research skills.

Criteria For Admission (Subject Specific Requirements) To Programme

The Senator George J. Mitchell Institute for Global Peace, Security and Justice requires applicants for this MA programme to have normally as a minimum a 2:1 honours degree (or equivalent recognised qualification) in an Arts, Humanities or Social Sciences discipline or another cognate subject area. Those applicants with a 2:2 Honours degree (or equivalent qualification acceptable to the University) may be admitted if they hold a Masters degree, or if they have 3 years relevant working experience in the field of conflict transformation, youth work, social justice or related experience in community engagement or public service delivery.

Additional Admissions Information for International Students

International students wishing to apply to Queen's University Belfast (and for whom English is not their first language), must be able to demonstrate their proficiency in English in order to benefit fully from their course of study or research. Non-EEA nationals must also satisfy UK Visas and Immigration (UKVI) immigration requirements for English language for visa purposes. Evidence of an IELTS* score of 6.5, with not less than 5.5 in any component, or an equivalent qualification acceptable to the University is required. *Taken within the last 2 years.
