 (Huntington)
- Religious 'extremists' a few 'bad apples'
- 'Ambivalence of the sacred' (Appleby)





Develops general theoretical ways of thinking about the role of religion in peacemaking & peacebuilding through a case study of Northern Ireland




The Political Peace Process



- Back channels of communication
- Effectiveness of sacred spaces ('exude redemption', p 106); safe, secure
- Ripple effect among politicians

The Social Peace Process



- Larger role for religion in social peace processes
- Active vs. passive peacemaking
- Rooted in civil society
- Local vs. 'institutional' leaders

Civil Society's Strategic Social Spaces

Intellectual	Institutional
Ecumenism, anti-sectarianism	Cross-community activities, peace initiatives
Market	Political
Transitional justice work with prisoners and families, social gospel	Mediation, backchannel political communication, formal political representation
