
The British Society of Gerontology Northern Ireland (BSG NI)

The Age Friendly Network NI will be hosting an Age Friendly Futures Summit from 10am-3pm on Tuesday 4th November 2025, in the Titanic Visitors Centre, Belfast. The Age Friendly summit aims to bring together senior decision makers and representatives from across government, community and voluntary sector organisations to discuss the core aspects that make up an Age Friendly Community; Outdoor spaces and buildings, Transport, Housing, Social Participation, Respect and Social Inclusion, Civic Participation and Employment, Communication and Information and Community Support and Health Services.

The event will centre around three key objectives;

- 1. Raising awareness of Age friendly Northern Ireland
- 2. Influencing policy direction and change
- 3. Direction of travel for Age Friendly NI

The summit will also showcase some of the excellent work going on across all 11 Councils, share good practice, present the findings from the Age Friendly evaluation and place particular emphasis on the importance of planning appropriately for an ageing society.

CELEBRATING SUCCESS OF NETWORK MEMBERS



Queen's on Ageing members Dr. Mihalis Doumas, Dr Matthew Rodger and Dr. Gary Mitchell, together with Prof Ioanna Latu and Prof Donncha Hanna have been awarded a HEA North South Emerging Hubs of Excellence funding award.

The funding was announced by Taoiseach Micheál Martin TD and Minister for Further and Higher Education, Research, Innovation and Science, James Lawless TD last week.

The total value of the award is €4million, with QUB portion being more than €1million over 48 months. The aim of the project is to 'Enhance wellbeing and quality of life in Parkinson's disease (PD-Life), through an all-Ireland, multidisciplinary, multi-institutional PD research hub'. The project is led by Queen's PI <u>Dr Mihalis Doumas</u> from the <u>School of Psychology</u> in collaboration with <u>University College Cork</u> PI <u>Professor Suzanne Timmons</u>.




Emily Bowman was presented with her *Publication of the Year Award* by the Perioperative Cognition and Delirium ISTAART Professional Interest Area.



Please find details of a fully funded PhD opportunity at the Ageing Research Centre, University of Limerick. The project will focus on exploring alternative care pathways for older adults seeking emergency care.

This programme of research aims to evaluate the impact of implementing an Age-Friendly National Ambulance Service (NAS), guided by the evidence-based 4Ms framework, with the goal of improving outcomes and experiences for older adults while safely reducing ambulance conveyance to Emergency Departments (ED).
