# Study abroad themes

Below are some of Queen's thematic areas for Study Abroad. These are just some of the wide range of modules on offer within these themes – take them as a bundle, mix and match or add something new – the choice is yours!\*

## Unique to Queen's

Are you interested in studying something outside the box or something which gives you a real sense of the place? Immerse yourself in Northern Ireland with some of the below modules which are unique to Queen's.

### Level 1

### Understanding Northern Ireland: History, Politics and Anthropology

This module provides an overview of the history and politics of the state of Northern Ireland, using anthropological understandings of ethnicity and nationalism to examine how Unionism and Irish Nationalism developed.

### The Politics of Deeply Divided Societies

Explore the study of the politics of deeply divided societies such as Northern Ireland, South Africa under Apartheid and the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, with an examination of ethnic and national conflict in terms of global politics.

### Peace and Conflict Studies

This module introduces you to the study of civil wars and the fields of conflict analysis and peace studies, in the study of the outbreak, development and resolution of armed civil conflicts.

### Northern Ireland: Identities, Ideologies and Futures

This module introduces students to sociological approaches to identity, peace and conflict in Northern Ireland. The nature of Northern Ireland's peace process is analysed in relation to contemporary local evidence as well as to scholarly debates about conflict transformation.

Explores the challenges and opportunities of new emerging technologies such as cloud computing, social media, the internet of things and big data

### Environmental Catastrophes

Environmental catastrophes occur when there is a rapid departure from normality and humans and/or ecosystems are unable to adapt. We explore the causes, mechanisms and consequences of a range of geohazards and human-induced catastrophes, including volcanic eruptions, tsunamis and biodiversity loss. We will also consider theoretical constructs such as the Anthropocene, ecosystem resilience, and tipping points in the Earth System.

### Climate Change

Climate change is one of the most pressing and challenging issues facing humanity. We explore the complex myriad of issues connected with this fundamental crisis, ranging from the physical scientific basis to the human response in adapting to and mitigating climate change at the international and individual level.

### Global Issues in Agriculture

This module investigates issues affecting agriculture at an international level. These include issues such as food safety, global population growth and food security, and climate change. In addition, mechanisms of policy formation and impacts of recent policy changes (such as decoupling of EU agricultural support) will be discussed. Possible future changes in agriculture related to issues such as obesity, or to increasing competition from aquaculture enterprises, will also be addressed.



## Science for Arts Students

Your study abroad semester or year is the ideal time to expand your academic horizons and to study something outside of your normal academic discipline. Queen's offers a range of science modules which require no prior science study.

### Forensic Psychology and Crime

This module will introduce students to key topics in Forensic Psychology including theories of offending, the development of offending, the rehabilitation of offenders, the criminal justice system, criminal statistics, policing, the public's response to crime, and the forensic psychology subfield of victimology (the impact of crime on victims and those responding to crime and criminals). In particular, this module will focus on (1) fundamental applications of psychology, as a science, for understanding important forensic issues, and (2) psychology as applied to the criminal justice system both from the perspective of the offender and the victim.

### Computer Science Challenges

Computer Science Challenges provides an opportunity for students to engage with practical and challenging problems in Computer Science. The course will offer a range of topical areas in Computer Science such as, data science, machine learning, cybersecurity or computing systems that students can select a project within.

### Programming

This module introduces the fundamentals of object-oriented programming. Real-world problems and exemplar code solutions are examined to encourage effective data modelling, code reuse and good algorithm design. Fundamental OO programming concepts including abstraction, encapsulation, inheritance and polymorphism are practically reviewed through case studies, with an emphasis on testing and the use of code repositories for better management of code version control.

### Environmental Change: past, present and future

This module provides an introduction to the principles and techniques used to reconstruct past environments and detect environmental change mostly during the last 2.6 million years, the Quaternary. It looks at the history of palaeoecology and the underlying theory and ecological principles that enable the interpretation of information from ancient deposits. The primary palaeoecological techniques and their limitations are described. Case studies show how some techniques have been applied to provide a range of palaeoenvironmental information.

# Choosing what to study



Study abroad students normally take three modules (classes) per semester. Modules are usually worth 20 CATS points each (5 US Credits) and students require 60 CATS Points per semester (this equates to 15–18 US Credits or 30 ECTS credits).

Students can usually select modules from Level 1 and 2 without evidence of prior study. Modules at Level 3 often require demonstration of relevant study.

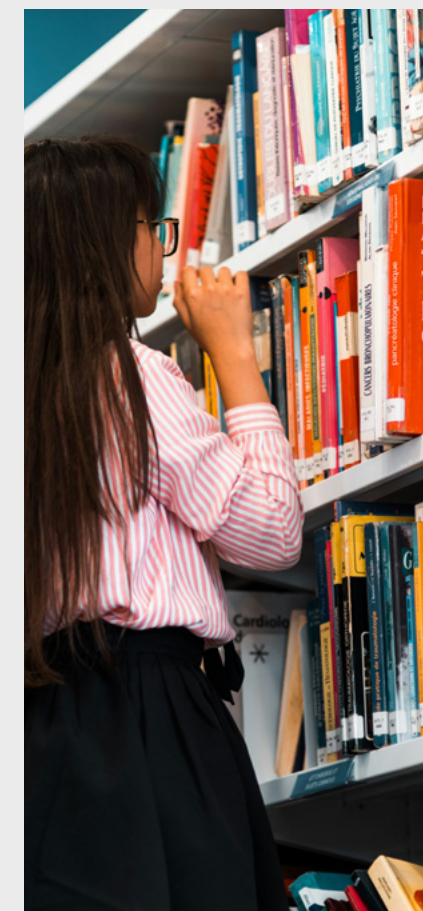

Students should agree module choices with their home institution's study abroad adviser before submitting an application to ensure they are appropriate to the student's level of study and that your home university will award transfer credit.

## Teaching Methods

Learning in the UK and Ireland is much more independent than in other countries. The teaching of a module will usually be based on lectures, supported by tutorials or seminars, which incorporate group discussion. Students are also expected to supplement formal teaching with their own private study, with the student determining how much reading they wish to do.





# How do I apply?

Study Abroad is open to those students currently undertaking an undergraduate degree from an accredited university. Applicants should normally have completed at least one year of university study.

## Visa Requirements

Semester Study Abroad students require a Visitor Study Visa whereas those undertaking a full academic year require a Student Visa Route (formerly Tier 4 Visa). Queen's will provide the required documentation to successful study abroad applicants for their visa application.

Students are required to have a GPA of 3.0 (or equivalent) overall from their current home university. Some specific subject areas may require evidence of prior study and attainment.

Module choices, an academic reference and official transcripts from the home university outlining grades obtained to date are required at the time of application. Students are also required to meet English Language requirements. Applicants do not need to provide evidence of English language proficiency if:

- they are applying to come to Queen's for a Study Abroad programme as part of a degree course at a university in: Antigua and Barbuda, Australia, The Bahamas, Barbados, Belize, Canada, Dominica, Grenada, Guyana, Jamaica, New Zealand, St Kitts and Nevis, St Lucia, St Vincent and the Grenadines, Trinidad and Tobago, United States of America;
- and the normal language of instruction at their home university is English;
- and they have already completed one year of study at their home university at the time of application to Queen's;
- and they have achieved a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0

## Application Deadlines

Semester 1 Fall/Full

Semester 2 Spring:  
**31 October 2025**

All other applicants must provide evidence of English language proficiency of IELTS 6.0 or 6.5 (depending on subject area) with a minimum of 5.5 in all four elements of the test, or an equivalent qualification acceptable to Queen's.

# Getting here

## By air

**Belfast is served by two airports:** George Best Belfast City Airport and Belfast International Airport which are both linked to the city by regular bus services.

Dublin International Airport is located approximately 2 hours by bus. Belfast, as the capital of Northern Ireland, is connected to the rest of the UK, Ireland and Europe by sea, road, and air.

## By sea

Fast ferry services including Stena Line and P&O Ferries make multiple daily crossings from Northern Ireland to ports in Scotland and England.
