

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Recent Successes

- 1. AHRC award of £800k in July 2016, the largest grant to be awarded under the Partnership for Conflict, Crime, and Security Research (PaCCS) Conflict Theme
- MA in Conflict Transformation and Social Justice: 31
 registered students in second year of operation, one-third
 (10) of them international students
- 3. Four-week Summer School more than doubled intake between 2015 and 2016 with 58 participants in July 2016



- 250 PGT students entered School in Sept 2016 128 of these are international students.
- 2. The School has recently undergone an International Review chaired by Prof. Teo Forcht-Dagi. Resulting in merger with William J. Clinton Leadership Institute.
- 3. School staff secured large grants to examine whistleblowing (£150K), the economic effects of the Irish Famine (£150K), and the use of big data to help agri-food industry (£175K).

- Merger has been successful, students enrolled and programmes started, due to the professionalism and enthusiasm of School staff
- Over £400,000 secured research income, with contracts worth another £500,000 in final stages of agreement. PRP – the Centre for Evidence and Social Innovation – launched from within School

- ✓ investment in support to free up more academic time




