OVERVIEW

This is a unique and innovative interdisciplinary programme taught through subject areas that include law, anthropology, English, history, philosophy, politics, psychology, sociology and the creative arts. Module choice within the programme will permit you to build your own personalised portfolio of knowledge and learning within the area of conflict transformation and social justice. You will be taught by academics and practitioners whose expertise is both national and global and who offer research-led teaching in areas of conflict such as South/ Southeast Asia, the Middle East, Southern Europe, South America and Northern Ireland.

CONTENT

Students will study and critically examine the key conceptual, moral, legal, political and cultural issues that relate to conflict, conflict transformation and social justice. This will correlate to the fields of political science, law, sociology, history, anthropology, English, drama and psychology. The modules on offer will be streamed and students will have an opportunity to choose a stream in which they would wish to specialise. Students will take modules from one of the following:

Stream 1: Conflict Transformation **Stream 2:** Asserting Social Justice, Inclusion and Rights

Stream 3: Religion, Society, Peace-building and Conflict

Students are required to complete three compulsory taught modules (all 20 CATS):

- Global Concepts and Practices of Conflict Transformation and Social Justice
- Conducting Research in Conflict Transformation and Social Justice
- Making Knowledge Work

Plus the triple-weighted dissertation (60 CATS)

In addition to the compulsory modules, students take 60 CATS points of optional modules from existing programmes delivered by the School of Arts, English and Languages; the School of Law; the School of History, Anthropology, Philosophy and Politics; the

School of Psychology; and the School of Social Sciences, Education and Social Work. Within each stream students must take modules from at least two Schools.

A student cannot take more than 40 credits in any School. Where a student wishes to take more than 40 credits in a particular School, it is recommended that they apply for the Master's programme in that School.

The taught modules are delivered during two 12 week semesters. For further information see the Institute website.

CAREERS

The MA programme provides our graduates with the skills to pursue a wide range of careers in the private, public and voluntary sectors, both domestically and internationally. In addition, the learning and intellectual environment provided by the Institute will prepare students for doctoral study. We increasingly find that undergraduate degrees alone are insufficient to command secure appropriate employment. Postgraduate taught degrees are used to top up learning and employability skills, and enhance knowledge and information. Some employers are less interested in the topic of the postgraduate degree and more in the advanced study skills and employability skills it furnishes. The study and employability skills associated with the MA in Conflict Transformation and Social Justice include:

- Group work
- Independent learning
- The collection and analysis of information
- Research skills
- Problem solving
- Communication skills, oral and written
- Working under time constraints and to deadlines
- Presentation skills

Occasionally, the knowledge content and study and employability skills garnered in a postgraduate degree lend themselves to specific careers. Possible careers facilitated by the MA in Conflict Transformation and Social Justice include:

- Work in the third sector, charities and civil society
- Work in the fields of conflict transformation, peace and reconciliation, and conflict resolution
- Social and community work, dispute resolution and counselling
- Policing
- Community development in divided communities and conflict zones
- Work in international aid agencies and non-governmental organisations in the fields of peace and development, human rights, religion and conflict, victims, trauma, refugees, emergency relief and the like.

In addition to traditional students who are looking for a postgraduate degree to either top up skills or as a route into a specific career, postgraduate degrees are increasingly used by professionals and practitioners looking for continuing professional development (CPD) in their field. The MA in Conflict Transformation and Social Justice acts as useful CPD for the following careers:

Average of six hours contact teaching hours per week for the first semester. In the second semester, as well as two hours contact on an Elective module, the Borders Internship module will involve three days of a work-based placement, as well as supervision with a member of academic staff.

Students should expect to spend 10-12 hours of independent study for every two hours in seminars and lectures, spread across the course of the semester. However, the second semester Borders Internship involves a more complex mix of work-based learning and supervision.

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OVERVIEW

Borders have become the key site and central concern of global security practices and theory, from the Mexican-United States border to the Mediterranean ports of the EU. The many facets of borders, as containers of identity, sites of power and points of weakness will be introduced and analysed, showing they have never been more important. This programme will help students navigate this complex terrain from a firm grounding in critical security studies, offering the chance to apply their academic insights within a work-based environment with borders/security professionals through the Borders Internship module.

CONTENT

The programme has three different components: Core modules, an Elective module, and a dissertation.

Core Modules: offer foundational knowledge and understanding in Global Security and Borders, practical experience and active learning within a work-based situation, as well as teaching the key skills regarding how to design a research project.

These compulsory modules include:

- Approaches to Research Design
- Borders Internship (double-weighted – 40 CATS)
- Contemporary Security
- Global Security and Borders

Elective Modules: offer the chance to specialise in a particular area of interest, build on foundational knowledge, and develop focused expertise.

One module is to be chosen from a range including*:

- Carbon Literacy for a Low Carbon Society and Economy
- Conflict Intervention
- Ethnic Conflict and Consensus: The Power of Institutions
- Global Terrorism
- Institutions and Politics of the EU
- International Political Economy
- Philosophy of Conflict and War
- The Politics of the Republic of Ireland
- * This list of elective modules may vary from year to year



Dissertation: to develop a particular area of specialism, facilitate independent learning and instil a variety of skills, students will also write a dissertation of no more than 15,000 words.

ASSESSMENT

A combination of seminar presentations, learning journals, literature reviews, portfolios, written essays, and a 60-credit, 15,000 word dissertation.

CAREERS

All of the MA programmes offered in the School provide our graduates with the skills to pursue a wide range of careers in the private, public and voluntary sectors. In addition they provide an appropriate basis for those who wish to proceed to doctoral-level study.

This MA has the particular benefit of an Internship module where students will learn to manage their time and acquire transferable skills in a work-based environment. Potential careers emerging from this degree include local, regional and national government, policy analysis, border agencies, customs and excise, and research for interest and advocacy NGOs.

OVERVIEW

This programme is designed to analyse various aspects of International Relations in a scholarly. critical and methodologically sophisticated manner. Having introduced the theoretical and methodological components which facilitate our study of the field, the aim is to use these tools to examine, explain and understand the issues, topics and processes that make up our world, from security and terrorism. migration and mobility, to global financial crises. The programme offers a balance between providing core content in the field of International Relations while allowing students to actively choose their area of specialism.

CONTENT

The programme has three different components: Core modules, Elective modules, and an MA dissertation.

Core Modules: to acquire foundational knowledge and understanding in International Relations, students will take four core modules.

- Approaches to Research Design
- Contemporary Security
- International Political Economy
- Theories and Issues in International Relations

Elective Modules: to enable students to specialise in areas of interest, build on foundational knowledge, and develop focused expertise, students can choose from a range of electives

Students must take one of:

- Conflict Intervention
- Global Terrorism

Students can take one additional module from a list including*:

- Conflict Intervention (if not already taken)
- Global Terrorism (if not already taken)
- Carbon Literacy for a Low Carbon Society and Economy
- Ethnic Conflict and Consensus: The Power of Institutions
- Gender, Politics and Democracy
- Institutions and Politics of the EU Philosophy of Conflict and War

Dissertation: to enable students to develop their particular area of specialism, facilitate independent learning and instil a variety of skills, students must also write a 15,000 word dissertation.

ASSESSMENT

The programme is assessed by a mixture of examination, continuous assessment (eg essays, projects, portfolios) and presentations.

CAREERS

Graduates from the MA in International Relations currently work in local and national government, international and national NGOs and charities, academia (as lecturers and researchers), and the private sector (eq. as lawyers and policy analysts).

OVERVIEW

The programme seeks to develop students' knowledge of the historical and political contexts – regional, national and European – in which the Northern Ireland Assembly operates. Students can develop a detailed understanding of legislative practice through work-based learning in the Northern Ireland Assembly, and develop their analytical, communication, employability and research skills.

CONTENT

At the core of this degree is a nine-month assessed placement with the Northern Ireland Assembly where students will be placed in one of several business units (eg a Committee, the Bills Office, Research and Information Services). In addition, students take two taught modules which set the work of the Assembly in the wider contexts of devolution in Northern Ireland and of European integration. Following the placement and production of a portfolio and themed report, students complete a 15,000-word project or dissertation on a topic concerning legislative practice and/ or studies.

The programme is of particular interest to those wishing to know more about Irish politics (North and South), European politics, political conflict, and political theory.

OVERVIEW

This programme provides dynamic and critical study in Violence. Terrorism and Security. Its aim is to help students develop a critical and analytical approach to problems in history and the contemporary world of these three areas. It challenges accepted wisdom and opens up the debate about the role of violence in relation to political power in the late 20th and early 21st centuries.
