What is a Registered Nurse in Learning **Disabilities** Nursing (RNLD)?

An RNLD is key in supporting people with learning disabilities to achieve an optimum level of health and well-being.

RNLD's work in partnership with the person with a learning disability and their family/carer to provide specialist and individualised healthcare.

They do this by promoting independence, autonomy and social inclusion in healthcare services.

RNLD's work in a wide range of areas including community teams, specialist teams (complex care, mental health, health promotion, epilepsy, Child and Adolescent Mental Health -CAHMS) hospitals, nursing and residential care, prisons, schools.

MENTAL HEALTH NURSING

- A Mental Health Nurse promotes and supports a persons mental health, they care for people across the lifespan.
- A Mental Health Nurse cares and treats people in distress by various means, such as the therapeutic relationship and use of different therapies.
- Mental Health Nurses work in a variety of settings, seeing people in their own homes, in primary care settings, as well as general hospitals and mental health facilities.
- Mental Health Nurses are sought across the world so it can be a passport to travel. They can develop specialist skills to work with certain groups of people or use specialist therapies like CBT or EMDR. They can develop in a range of areas such as clinically, education/research, management and policy.

Adult Nursing: A varied and rewarding career

- Adult nurses care for patients suffering from a wide range of health conditions, from minor injuries to acute and long term conditions
- Adult nurses play a vital role in providing, leading and coordinating care that is compassionate, evidencebased, and person-centred
- Adult nurses work in a wide variety of settings caring for people in their home and in hospitals



Field of Children & Young People's Nursing

Who is a Children's Nurse?

A children's nurse works as part of a supportive and inspiring team, to provide children, young people and their families with the vital care and compassion they need, encompassing child health nursing.

What does a Children's Nurse do?

Cares and advocates for premature babies through to young people aged 18 and into early adulthood. Promoting health and wellbeing of all children and young people in partnership with the family, to make a difference.

Where does a Children's Nurse work?

In NHS hospitals; community settings; children's hospice; special needs school; GP surgery; as a specialist practitioner; public health; child protection; youth justice system; service manager; higher education and research.

Career opportunities for the Children's Nurse

Fantastic employment options in all the above areas, influencing policy and practice. Can be challenging, but a privilege and rewarding for the enthusiastic caring team member, upholding professional standards with endless learning opportunities for career development.
