Oral history is a powerful resource in County Fermanagh that can help us understand how our ancestors lived in the recent past. As such, we place great importance on the collection of oral testimony from across the county as part of our programme. To achieve this objective, we recognise that training is required for volunteers and we have designed an online campus specifically to enable participants to learn how to conduct and record oral history interviews. Securing oral histories for future generations is an important part of our remit and to facilitate this we intend to embed the collected narratives into an interactive Memory Map that will showcase the unique story of Lough Erne, while linking diverse themes by both people and place.




Some of your feedback on the 2021 Module

MEMORY MAPPING: LIFE ON LOUGH ERNE

oral history gathering/recording will continue through the lifecycle of the project, with a view to add your stories to the project Memory Map.

THE STUDY OF VERNACULAR BUILDINGS

second season of surveying to be conducted in the summer on a monthly basis to continue the training of a volunteer surveying team that can then conduct independent local surveys.

PEOPLE, POWER, PLACE & PAGEANTRY

a second community-based archaeological excavation to be conducted in the Lisnaskea landscape in May 2022 as part of an investigation into the Maguire lordship of Fermanagh in the medieval period.

MAPPING BUILT HERITAGE OF THE ISLANDS

this project will identify and map a selection of previously occupied islands on the lough and will aim to investigate what life was like for the people who lived on them.

ORAL HISTORY ROADSHOWS

the team will deliver a series of face-toface events to support and share oral history collecting, the first of which will be 23rd March 2022

LEGACY PROJECT: MEMORY MAP – LIFE ON LOUGH ERNE

collating the results of the five projects together for curation as an online GIS-based resource.
