a second community-based archaeological excavation to be conducted in the Lisnaskea landscape in early May 2022 as part of an investigation into the Maguire lordship of Fermanagh in the medieval period. We will be in touch soon to confirm dates and a programme of activities..

THE STUDY OF VERNACULAR BUILDINGS

second season of surveying to be conducted in the summer on a monthly basis to continue the training of a volunteer surveying team that can then conduct independent local surveys June 2022

MEMORY MAP – GATERING STORIES OF LIFE ON LOUGH ERNE

ongoing engagement by volunteers sharing and recording their stories and photographs for the online GIS-based resource.

ORAL HISTORY ROADSHOWS

the team will deliver a series of face-to-face events to support and share oral history collecting, the second of which will be in June or July 2022

MAPPING BUILT HERITAGE OF THE ISLANDS

this project will identify and map a selection of previously occupied islands on the lough and will aim to investigate what life was like for the people who lived on them.
