Background to the Project



- Successful evaluation within SEHSCT of a new model of Level 1 care in primary care for asymptomatic testing for STIs
- Move to NHS care services for prisoners should be designed to meet their needs and to standards expected in the wider community
- SEHSCT responsible for prison health since 2008
- Consultant led in-reach service, primarily for symptomatic patients
- Little nurse involvement and no health promotion focus
- Opportunity to reach the 'hard to reach'





Development of a nurse led service to provide asymptomatic sexual health check ups for men in prison

Participatory action research with young men in HWC to develop an animation promoting a positive approach to STI testing.



Developing a nurse led service in prison health care



- 30 nurses have completed the eLearning and attended training
- 8 nurses attended a bespoke 3 day training on sexual health
- System of reporting positive results to SHS set up
- Decision to pilot the service with a small group of nurses who received site visits
- Different models introduced at different sites









- Case note audit of 171 patients seen at the service
- Laboratory reports and data bases
- 8 key variables on documentation of sexual history
- 3 key performance indicators (KPIs) on the management of positive chlamydia results



KPI : 97% of people accessing services with needs relating to STIs should have a relevant sexual history documented





KPI: 85% of patients should be offered screening for chlamydia, gonorrhoea, syphilis and HIV

Including Hepatitis B+C, all 5 tests were offered to 96% of patients,
 with a 94% uptake

How patients were to receive results was documented in 92%

Management of positive results



- 12 positive chlamydia results (7% positivity rate) and 3 gonorrhoea positive results.
- 2 new cases of syphilis were detected and a further 2 cases of known HIV were highlighted.
- 7 cases of Hepatitis C (3 previously diagnosed) and 3 new cases of Hepatitis B. While the chlamydia positive cases were managed by the nurse, all other positive cases were seen by the GUM consultant and referred to Hepatology.



Management of positive results



- 50% of chlamydia treated < 2 working days from result
- A further 25% < 4 working days
- 2 cases took up to 9 days
- 1 patient deported before treatment
- 90% had partner notification discussion documented
- 100% had all 5 tests





- Partner notification

ii) Medium of communication

- Language & accent realistic, easy to understand
- Style animated explainer, eye-catching visuals
- Tone simple, fun, narrative audio

iii) Script & storyboard – backbone


- Creative brief 2 scenarios

- Two characters discussing a personal issue!








Enabling Environment & Voice
