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## **Meet our Researchers**



Prof Bronagh Blackwood

Bronagh's career has spanned 38 years and began in clinical practice as a registered general nurse and since then has taken a lot of twists and turns. She worked clinically in Northern Ireland and Germany in critical care areas. Then she entered the clinical education and research field before eventually ending up at Queens as one of the founding members of staff in the School of Nursing and Midwifery in 1995. Bronagh's PhD was awarded by Kings College London in 2005. In 2012 she moved to the Centre for Infection and Immunity, now CEM. Her research focuses mainly on the impact of mechanical ventilation and clinical interventions to improve outcomes for ICU patients. Her work, therefore, focuses on the translation of evidence into bed-side practice and encouraging its uptake.



#### **Dr Damian Downey**

Damian gualified in medicine from QUB and his early clinical training and airway inflammation research was carried out in Belfast. He undertook specialist respiratory training in Manchester and Brisbane and, in 2006, was appointed as a cystic fibrosis (CF) consultant in Bristol. Damian returned to Belfast in 2011 to co-direct the N Ireland Regional Adult CF Centre before moving to his current role as a Clinical Senior Lecturer in 2017. His research interests remain in chronic lung disease, specifically CF and bronchiectasis. He is exploring how we treat pulmonary exacerbations and identify clinical and biomarker signatures that will predict outcome. Damian also leads a CF Clinical trial program and is a Chief Investigator on a number of pivotal new drugs in CF and Co-Director of the European Clinical Trials Network for CF.



Dr Andriana Margariti

Andriana completed her PhD on Cardiovascular medicine in King's College London in 2008. Her postdoctoral training was in the Cardiovascular Division of the BHF Centre of Excellence at King's College London (KCL). In 2013 she was appointed as a Lecturer in CEM and promoted to Senior Lecturer in 2017, where she is leading the facilities of induced pluripotent stem cells in CEM. Andriana's research program is based on the remarkable approach of cell reprogramming which will allow us to establish homogeneous populations of endothelial cells and develop effective treatments for cardiovascular disease and diabetes. Her research demonstrates the therapeutic potential of "re-born" reprogrammed endothelial cells which could have transforming consequences for regenerative and personalised medicine.



Lorcan graduated with Honours in Medicine and trained in General Internal and Respiratory Medicine. He is a Consultant Respiratory Physician and Clinical Reader in CEM. He is internationally known for his research in cough and has undertaken a range of research studies from evaluation of diagnostic protocols relevant to clinical practice to mechanistic studies designed to elucidate the pathogenesis of chronic cough. His current research is focussed on ion channels and neuro-inflammatory mechanisms in the airways. Lorcan established and leads the NI Specialist Cough Clinic which provides the opportunity for patients to participate in a number of pivotal Phase II national and International clinical trials of novel therapies for cough. He has also worked extensively in the area of chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD) and is Joint Clinical Lead for the NI Clinical Research Network for Respiratory Health.

Denise was also the recipient of the Outstanding Leadership Award at the Staff Excellence Awards, which took place at the Whitla Hall on Friday, 9 February 2018, in recognition of her commitment to Postdoctoral development within Queen's. She has successfully established a new Postdoctoral Initiative to enhance and diversify postdoctoral career development and was instrumental in the creation of the Faculty Postdoctoral Development Centre.
