

Nurses Experiences in Delivering Trauma Care at the Saudi Southern Border

BACKGROUND

Nurses who deal with patients affected by major traumatic injuries are challenged in meeting the physical, cognitive and emotional demands of these patients. Von Rueden et al., (2010) Furthermore, nurses in trauma care settings are often exposed to threats and fear. Freeman, Fothergill-Bourbonnais and Rashotte, (2014). At present, the Saudi trauma care system is facing a significant challenge that is imposed attacks at the southern cities from across the Yemen border. Consequently, increased number and severity of traumatic conditions is associated with more problems and constraints to all healthcare providers and nurses in particular. Thus, there is a need to explore the experiences and challenges of trauma nurses who are working in a conflict war zone at the southern border in KSA.

A descriptive phenomenological approach using semi-structured interviews. Sampling: The study will use a homogeneous purposeful sample. Analysis: collected data will be carried out using thematic content analysis (Braun and Clarke, 2006).
