
Module Highlight! Day-trip to Dublin – with visit to the Museum of Literature Ireland and attendance at a play in the Abbey theatre.












Seamus Heaney Showcase: two weeks in which we study recently published work from two of the Creative Writing lecturers in English and discuss their work in a Q and A session.






















ENG 1010 Adventures in Shakespeare

 It.


PROGRAMME: Single Honours English:

3 English modules in each semester / 6 per year

These can be chosen from English literature modules (ENG) and English language modules (ENL).

Note: SH English cannot take Creative Writing modules at stages 2 and 3. These are open only to those on the English with Creative Writing pathway.

[1 of the 6 modules can be a Faculty elective from another subject.]



PROGRAMME: English with Creative Writing:

Introduction to Creative Writing at stage 1.

There are 3 Creative Writing modules at stage 2:

Scriptwriting Prose Poetry

You choose 2 of these 3 modules.

Remaining module choices can be drawn from any English literature or English language modules.


English with Creative Writing students will do a double dissertation at stage 3.



PROGRAMME: English and linguistics

All students will take ENL1001: Introduction to English Language.

English with linguistics students must take a minimum of 6 ENL coded modules across the 3 years of your degree.



PROGRAMME: Joint Honours English & 2nd subject:

3 English modules in each year across the 2 semesters. 3 modules in your 2nd subject across the 2 semesters. 6 modules per year.

Repeat at stages 2 and 3.
