## 2023 Medieval Trip to Bruges and Ghent: AEL Faculty Outbound Mobility Fund

As part of their medieval studies, postgraduates in the School of English participated in a trip to the medieval towns of Ghent and Bruges, in Belgium. Both cities were important centres of commerce throughout the middle ages and are therefore replete with fascinating buildings, monuments and artefacts that afford a unique insight into the lives of ordinary people.





Finally, the trip culminated with a visit to St. Bavo's Cathedral, where they saw Jan Van Eyck's monumental Ghent Altarpiece—one of the most celebrated (and beautiful) artworks of the entire middle ages.
















