The forum has nearly doubled in size, and we now have around 38 members which includes service users/carers, staff and students. Most recently we have developed a steering committee, our own website page, created an induction pack and MS Teams forms to manage involvement and feedback. Having been a carer myself I am very passionate about the service user and carer voice being heard.

Steering Committee

The Steering Committee is made up of 14 forum and staff members and the purpose of this committee is to oversee PCEP business to ensure the whole forum is running smoothly and embedded fully within the School. This committee meets around 8 times a year depending on business needs. All work that is undertaken by this committee is shared with all members of the PCEP Forum.

Full Forum Meetings

The forum consists of around 38 patients and carers, staff members and students. The Forum was established around 10 years ago and continues to go from strength to strength with PCEP members being involved in all aspects of School business.

The forum meets quarterly in September, December, March and June each year and it follows a blended meeting approach of either attending in person or online.

Involvement in Education



The First Graduation for QUB School of Nursing and Midwifery Graduate **Entry Masters Professional Nursing** (GEMS) took place on Thursday 13th October 2022 in the Whitla Hall. This led to three of our then appointed Honorary Lecturers in the Academic Procession at Graduation.



Patient and Carer Education Partnership Website

In 2022 we developed and launched our own PCEP website. This is an independent site of the School of Nursing and Midwifery and Queen's University Belfast, and it is managed and updated by the PCEP Co-Ordinator. The launch of the website is something that the Forum is extremely proud of, and we are working hard to continually develop the website, adding more depth and continuing to showcase the excellent work of the forum.



Carers Week sessions are available to view on the PCEP Website, these have all been uploaded to the School's YouTube channel and have proved to be an excellent training resource. We are currently building a resource section on the website to share these resources and demonstrate the importance of working in partnership.

Collaboration within our School and Queen's University Belfast

GEMS (Graduate Entry Masters) Programme



The PCEP group have been integral to the coproduction of nursing and midwifery education across the School. Their input into the coproduction of the preregistration programmes was commended by the Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC) at the joint validation event between Queen's University and the NMC. Within this process, members of the PCEP also supported the codesign of the Graduate Entry Masters (GEMS) in Professional Nursing, the first two year degree for graduates leading to registration as a nurse.

PCEP members continue to play a key role in recruiting and supporting students across GEMS, a flagship programme for the School. For example, PCEP members assess and rank portfolios, then support the development of interview questions

prior to interviewing students as part of a tripartite team – this involves working with practice partners and academics to ensure the service user and care voice is represented as we recruit students with the correct values to be a nurse.

A key feature of the coproduced curriculum that PCEP members influenced was the focus on caring communication. This included an assessed role play to support students in developing these core skills. Members of the PCEP group now work with academics to provide feedback to students on the development of these essential skills in class.

PCEP members also support the development of partnership working for GEMs students in their final year as they support students in developing case studies for multidisciplinary team meetings incorporating the service user/ carer voice.

A core value in service user/ carer representation in nursing curricula is the power of the lived experience often recounted through storytelling. Whilst this remains in place across all our curricula, we have used the opportunity on the GEMS team to incorporate this valuable expertise of the PCEP group into assessment and supporting interactive learning activities.

Personal and Public Involvement (PPI) Network, QUB

Two members of the PCEP forum, Maria Sommerville and Mary Duffin, are also members of the PPI network at QUB.

The PPI Network at QUB are a community of best practice, working together to:

- ♣ Increase visibility and awareness of PPI being undertaken across the University, working in partnership with patients, carers, advocacy groups and those with lived experience.
- → Signpost researchers and PPI contributors to the dedicated website, ppihub.org, which contains indepth information about the Network.
- Expand the Network to ensure that all QUB PPI is represented and documented.
- ♣ Gather and collate PPI contributor and researcher perspectives and input e.g., to allow understanding of what training and support needs exist.
- Letwork e.g., PPI Ignite Network in Ireland.

The PCEP forum has been working alongside Dr Maelíosa McCrudden who is the lead co-ordinator for the PPI Network at QUB.

School of Pharmacy, QUB

The School of Pharmacy contacted the PCEP forum for advice and guidance on how to set up their own service user and carer forum within their School. They have involved one of our forum members in a piece of work which involved writing a scenario for their upcoming Objective Structured Clinical Examinations (OSCE). This led to numerous joint meetings with Pharmacy colleagues and the PCEP Steering Committee where we shared our Induction Pack, Involvement Chart, Letter of Engagement and MS Forms. Members of the PCEP Steering Committee were invited to attend meetings independently with the School of Pharmacy, to start the initial setup process, these meetings are ongoing.

Collaboration with Community Partners




Bournemouth University

The PCEP Forum has been working collaboratively alongside Bournemouth University since the beginning of 2022 to share best practice and ideas on

service user involvement. We have been working closely with Dr Mel Hughes, a Professor in social work and Academic Lead for the PIER (Public Involvement in Education and Research) partnership and Angela Paget and Peter Atkins who are PIER Officers at Bournemouth University. We have discussed the current involvement each University is offering, and we had great support from Bournemouth at our online Carers Week event in June 2023. Our Colleagues from Bournemouth provided information and support around the development of our PCEP Induction pack, this was very much appreciated and highlighted the importance of Co-Production and working together to share best practice. We will continue to collaborate and share good working practices around service users and carer involvement with Bournemouth, and we plan to arrange to meet face-to-face in the near future.



"Harnessing lived experience expertise is integral to health and social work education. It reminds us of the reality of the lived experience; the challenges of accessing care and support and, above all, provides evidence of what works. It is integral to improving the quality, relevance and impact on health and social care practice. Our students report that service users and carer involvement in their education has led to increased knowledge and understanding; ways of improving practice, enhanced resilience, opportunities for discussions and opportunities to gain feedback."





'Our service users and carers describe themselves as the bridgebuilders between theory and practice; providing current, real-life experiences to help students apply their learning. One student said, "Hearing firsthand experiences are essential when learning how to give patient centred care. It really helps to remind us why we are doing this and the impact we have."

Collaboration with Community Partners

NI Young Carers - Action for Children



Judith Younger from NI Young Carers, Action for Children was approached by a parent of a child who attends the Young Carers Service and who was also a member of the forum.

It was a privilege to be a part of this forum to advocate and share the incredible work of Young Carers. The opportunity to explain the impact a caring role has on a young person and how it affects their lives is something Jude is deeply passionate about. The approach which Jude used to present this information was via personal videos which had been recorded by young carers themselves and a short poem

that was written and narrated by another young carer. This allowed the audience to resonate with the issues many young carers face daily. Some of the issues highlighted included family support, friendships, education, socialising and how each young person was impacted differently but all with the sole purpose of caring for someone they love. We recognise that Young Carers are vulnerable to missing opportunities and experiences other young people enjoy and this was a fantastic opportunity to share this information within the forum.

Working with all the staff and members within the forum allowed Jude to feel at ease and comfortable to share her own firsthand experiences with the group. The staff were excellent with communicating directly with Jude and the Young Carers service.

During carers week we worked alongside the young carers we support to give them a platform to share their experiences of being a young carer. This was demonstrated by developing video content which was then published on our social media pages. By doing this, young carers had a means of having their voices heard and ultimately raise awareness of their roles as carers within our society. The PCEP Forum was instrumental in the development of this content providing support throughout the process.

It is the intention of the NI Young Carers Service to continue to support young carers in raising awareness of their caring role. We will continue working alongside key stakeholders such as schools, policy makers and indeed the PCEP forum who are in a unique position to support future Nurses and Midwives in identifying young carers and ensure they can access support at the earliest opportunity. We hope within the coming year to return to the PCEP forum and the school of nursing and spread more awareness about this in topic helping professionals within the health sector to use their voice to advocate for a marginalised group within our society.



Each day followed a different theme for all the fields of Nursing & Midwifery. The sessions were conducted as an informal chat between staff, PCEP member's and external organisations which gave the audience a true insight into what it is like for carers, families, and service users on a daily basis.

Monday 5th June 2023 - Midwifery - 'Partners as carers in maternity services'

Bethany and Lorna discussed the role of partners as carers during specific periods of the maternity journey through the experience of Bethany's partner Mark Connaughton.

Tuesday 6th June 2023 - Children and Younger Persons - 'Caring through the eyes of a younger person'

Judith and Lucy discussed the challenges that young carers face through family circumstances. Jude has worked with Action for Children's Young Carers Project for 11 years, working across Belfast, South-Eastern and Southern Trusts with a variety of families from many different backgrounds.

They chatted about family experiences and highlighted the support available from Action for Children as this is often hidden in society. It was lovely to hear from the young carers.

Gary and Sandra spoke compassionately with Brian who gave a recount of his personal odyssey as a devoted husband, steadfastly supporting his wife through her journey with dementia. He eloquently traced his story, commencing from the pre-diagnosis phase, navigating the complexities of caregiving, and ultimately arriving at the pivotal juncture of transitioning to long-term care.

Friday 9th June - Learning Disabilities - 'Caring through the eyes of an older person'

Ms Ailish McMeel, Lecturer QUB, Ms Maria Somerville, PCEP member and Anne Mallon, Carer

Maria and Ailish chatted with Anne who shared her perspective on her life journey as a carer for her daughter Kelly Ann which spans over decades.

Anne shared her experiences of years of campaigning for better services for people with Learning Disabilities and their carers.

Involvement in Research

Co-design of and evidenced informed service model of integrated palliative care for persons living with a serious mental illness.



My name is Marianne Tinkler, I am a Macmillan Palliative Care Nurse currently undertaking a PhD Fellowship at Queens University Belfast and a proud member of the Patient and Carer Education Partnership (PCEP) forum.

I have been a qualified nurse for the past 28 years and half of that has been within palliative care. My MSc in Supportive and Palliative Care involved persons with schizophrenia in the last days of life in 2018, alongside grounded clinical observation, has brought me to this point in tackling inequalities within palliative care and mental health for persons with serious mental illness. I am to address this by completing PhD Fellowship with the Co-design of an evidence informed

service model of palliative care for persons living with serious mental illness.

Globally, close to one billion people are living with a mental health disorder and is noted to be one of the most neglected areas in public health (WHO 2021). If you live with a severe mental illness, you have a greater mortality risk than the general population, experience health inequalities throughout life and represent a vulnerable, under-served and under-treated population. With the access to palliative care becoming a public health priority set to double over the next 4 decades, (Sleeman et al 2019), where does this leave this population and their basic human right to accessible palliative care?

The aim of the study is to co-design an evidenced informed service model of integrated palliative care for people living with a severe mental illness. This qualitative sequential study underpinned by interpretivism will consist of 6 phases and an expert reference group will inform all aspects of the study. 1. Establishment of the expert reference group. 2. Systematic literature review. 3. Semi structured interviews with bereaved caregivers. 4. Focus groups with service providers. 5. Co-design service model. 6. General recommendations to inform education and policy, further research, and service development within practice areas.

Reducing inequalities experienced by people with a severe mental illness is embedded in the National Health Service Long Term Plan. Future policy and practice will benefit from a better understanding of the needs of this client cohort and the development of a co-ordinated integrated care pathway to facilitate timely access to palliative care.

Within the PCEP at QUB I hope to be a voice from student/research and lived experience of mental illness. I hope also to bring a voice of bereaved caregivers of severe mental illness which is lost within the area of palliative and end-of-life care generally.
