





DARRAN MCCANN & GARRETT CARR

Thursday, 28 February at 8 pm in the Crescent Arts Centre

Darran McCann's debut novel *After the Lockout* was published to much acclaim in 2012. 'A wonderful novel about what history has done to Ireland' (Hilary Mantel). 'A wholly original, vigorous and insightful piece of writing' (Patricia Craig, *TLS*). His play, *Confession*, was produced by Accidental Theatre at the Brian Friel Theatre in 2008.

Garrett Carr was born in 1975. He grew up in Co. Donegal, in a town rather like Ballydog, the setting of his first young adult novel *The Badness of Ballydog*. That book and its sequel, *Lost Dogs*, were both listed as 2010 reads of the year by the *Irish Independent* and *The Times* (UK). He also has an abiding interest in the common ground between texts and maps, a relationship which he will explore in his talk.

Darran McCann and Garrett Carr are both lecturers in Creative Writing at Queen's University Belfast.

SAM THOMPSON

Sam Thompson is the author of the brilliant debut novel *Communion Town: a City in Ten Chapters*, which was long-listed for the 2012 Man Booker Prize. Sam Thompson is a lecturer in English Language and Literature at St Anne's College, Oxford.

MARK ANTHONY JARMAN

Mark Anthony Jarman is Canadian and teaches at the University of New Brunswick. He is a fiction and nonfiction writer, and the recipient of numerous awards, including a Gold National Magazine Award in nonfiction. Among his books are *New Orleans is Sinking* and *Dancing Nightly in the Tavern*. His collection of short stories, *19 Knives*, was described by A.S. Byatt in the *Guardian* as 'brilliant...the writing is extraordinary...gripping.'

KERRY HARDIE

Kerry Hardie was born in 1951 and grew up in County Down and is a member of Aosdána. She is the author of seven books of poetry, most recently *The Ash and the Oak and the Wild Cherry Tree*, and has also written two novels, *Hannie Bennet's Winter Marriage* and *The Bird Woman*. Indeed, many of her poems have a narrative slant: 'I need the trees to tell that other story/ the one that's numerous with wind and leaves.'

WAYNE MILLER & ANTHONY BRADLEY

Wayne Miller lives in Kansas City and teaches at the University of Missouri. He is the author of three highly acclaimed books of poetry, *The City, Our City* (2011), *The Book of Props* (2009) and *Only the Senses Sleep* (2006). He is the recipient of numerous awards, including the Lyric Poetry Award from the Poetry Society of America.
