Research projects and awards:

Fiona Magowan organised *The Costs of Culture: Ritual and the Domestic Moral Economy*, a conference held in the Council Chamber and Canada Room, QUB, on 16-17 September. Part of the ESRC funded project, **The Domestic Moral Economy in the Asia-Pacific**, it brought together leading UK and international scholars in economic anthropology, including Professors Chris Gregory, Jonathan Parry, Patricia Jeffery and Karen Sykes, with scholars from political economy and cultural geography. Sessions addressed how changing

The Leverhulme Trust funded project 'The politics of consumer credit in the UK, 1938-1992' has now ended. The principal investigator (Dr Sean O'Connell) has begun work with Dr Paul Corthorn and Dr Stuart Aveyard to produce the planned monograph and a book proposal is being reviewed by Oxford University Press. The team is also planning a workshop at Queens (for summer 2014), which will bring together a group of historians to examine 'The politics of consumer credit in Europe and the USA'. The workshop is a



collaboration with Institute Universitaire de France and will involve scholars from Harvard, Uppsala, and the German Historical Institute, Washington D.C., amongst others.

Crawford Gribben organised a conference on 'Puritans and Catholics in the trans-Atlantic world, 1500-1800' in TCD on 16-17 September, bringing to a conclusion a research project funded by the Irish Research Council's Collaborative Project Award (2012-13). The conference attracted a wide range of historians, from postgraduates to well-established experts, and from several continents. The organisers expect to prepare one or two volumes of essays for publication.

International connections:

Olwen Purdue visited the Irish Studies Center at our US strategic partner institution Boston College, MA, on 16-20 September, as part of our annual staff exchange. During the visit she met with members of the BC faculty as well as with post-doctoral fellows, research students and undergraduate students, and used the excellent research facilities at the university and the nearby Massachusetts Historical Society to enhance her current research on the history of poverty and welfare. She taught an undergraduate class on the role of the landed class in Northern Ireland politics, and delivered a research paper on 'The role of the workhouse in late nineteenth-century Belfast' to the Irish Studies Seminar. 

And finally ...

Congratulations to our honorary research fellow in Irish Studies **Prof.**John Wilson (Jack) Foster, who managed to evade a fine of £8577.50 for returning a QUB Library book a mere 47 years overdue. Jack recently discovered the book by Victorian poet Arthur Hugh Clough, a contemporary of Robert Browning and Alfred Tennyson, when he returned to Vancouver to clear out his locker at the University of British Columbia, where he had been based for a number of years. There he saw *The Poems of Arthur Hugh Clough* still had a due date stamp of 11 October 1966 from Queen's University Library. ...

Queen's said it was pleased to get the book back and would not be looking for Professor Foster to stump up the £8,577.50 fine.

'I suppose the moral of the story if you discover an overdue book is make sure it's really, really overdue before you think about returning it', the professor said. (*The Independent*, 15 Sept 2013).
