

Of all the professions, none has – justifiably – earned greater respect than medicine. The medical tradition, one that can be traced back several hundred years, is one of the north of Ireland's proudest claims to fame. Huge numbers of men and women have graduated and served the medical profession with great distinction not only in Ireland but throughout the world, often in the armed services, both abroad and at home.

Professor Richard Clarke, himself a widely respected anaesthetist and historian of that medical tradition, has in this volume made available the benefits of his extensive researches. It is a directory of doctors who qualified in Ireland before 1901. There are approaching a staggering six thousand names, practically all accompanied by essential and often fascinating biographical information, including details of parentage, dates of birth, marriage and death, and medical education and career.

This *Directory* is therefore of special value for anyone studying not only medical or local history but also for many genealogists tracing Ulster families. The information is derived from a wide variety of sources, published and unpublished, expertly set in the context of the development of the medical profession over several centuries, and includes an enthusiastic introduction from Sir Peter Froggatt. As an essential work of reference, it will also act as a record of Ireland's proud achievement in the field of medicine.
