




Belfast City Hall

About the Peter Mair Lecture

In 2012, the Political Studies Association of Ireland instituted the Peter Mair lecture in honour of one of Ireland's most distinguished political scientists. The lecture is delivered at the Association's annual conference and is to be published in *Irish Political Studies*.

This year's Lecture will be delivered by **Professor Nicole Bolleyer**, Chair of Comparative Political Science at the Geschwister Scholl Institute of Political Science, LMU Munich (Germany).

She is the author of several monographs including 'The State and Civil Society: Regulating Interest Groups, Parties and Public Benefit Organizations in Contemporary Democracies' (Oxford University Press 2018) and 'Civil Society's Democratic Potential'



(forthcoming with Oxford University Press). Her research has appeared in a wide range of leading journals such as Comparative Political Studies, Journal of Politics and the European Journal of Political Research. She currently directs the ERC-Consolidator Grant CIVILSPACE (Grant agreement ID: 101001458).

How to Study Political Parties: From Civil Society to the State and Back

Cartel party theory has put the study of party-state relations high on the research agenda, deliberately shifting the focus of researchers away from an understanding of political parties on the basis of their relationship with civil society or, indeed, as part of civil society itself. As fruitful as this reorientation has been, shaping party research since the early 1990s, this lecture argues that the resulting emphasis on "parties as governors" has produced downsides of its own. Cartel party theory reinforced a separation of the study of parties from the study of other membership organizations considered the very fabric of civil societies. While their governing role makes parties indeed distinct from the latter, the lecture argues that what parties do and how they function should be also assessed against other organizations such as interest groups or associations through which citizens engage in joint activities including but not restricted to political interest representation. Hence, we can gain from a stronger reconsideration of the traditional perspective on political parties as one type within a broader class of membership organizations, a perspective that cartel party theory set out to correct. The contention is that bringing the study of party back to civil society will generate a broader understanding of the possible roles political parties can (or cannot) play in contemporary democracy than an exclusive study of party as a separate genus.

About the Joint Fellowship

This year's Fellowship is jointly awarded to **John Coakley, Emeritus Professor at University College Dublin**, and **Michael Gallagher, Emeritus Professor at Trinity College Dublin**, for their exceptional contribution to the advancement of knowledge in the field of Irish politics, the mission of the Association, and to the field of political science more in general.



John Coakley is Emeritus Professor in the School of Politics & International Relations at University College Dublin, and Distinguished International Professor at Queen's University Belfast. He is a member of the Royal Irish Academy and was a Woodrow Wilson Scholar and a Fulbright Scholar. He was former President of the PSAI from 1988-1990 and the founding director of the Institute for British-Irish Studies at UCD (1999-2005, 2006-8). He was Secretary General of the International Political Science Association between 1994 and 2000, a fellow at the Wilson Centre from 2005-2006, and vice-President of the International Social Science Council from 2002-6. In July 2023, Coakley was the recipient of the International Political Science Association's prestigious Karl Deutsch Award, which recognises a prominent scholar engaged in crossdisciplinary research. His research interests lie across Irish politics, comparative politics, nationalism and ethnic conflict.



Michael Gallagher is Emeritus Professor of Comparative Politics and former Head of the Department of Political Science at Trinity College Dublin. He is a member of the Royal Irish Academy and has been Visiting Professor in New York University, City University, Hong Kong and Sciences-Po, Lille. His main areas of expertise are comparative electoral systems, political institutions, political parties, and Irish politics and he is author, co-author and editor of 19 books, including every edition of Politics in the Republic of Ireland.



To Do

This year's conference is being held in the City Centre, which is a short walk from the most famous (and beautiful!) parts of Queen's University. We recommend taking some time to see Queen's and have prepared a self-guided tour below that (without entering the Ulster Museum) should take approximately one hour.

Self-Guided Tour of Queen's University

From the City Centre, walk up Botanic Avenue and grab a coffee from Kaffe-O or Blue Train, and don't forget to visit No Alibis bookshop which has a great selection of fiction and non-fiction books (closed Sundays). After exiting Botanic Avenue, turn onto University Square to walk by the Queen's arts and humanities departments – the School of HAPP that are hosting this year's conference are based in houses 23-31. Once at the top of University Square, turn left to walk by the main gates of the Lanyon Building and snap the perfect photo. From here you can enter the Lanyon Building through the main entrance which takes you into the Black and White Hall. If you turn left through a set of glass doors and take the staircase, you will reach the Naughton Art Gallery (free entry). On exiting the Black and White Hall, you can take in the Quad at Queen's. Exit the quad and turn right to reach Botanic Gardens, where we recommend visiting the glass Palm House, the newly refurbished Tropical Ravine, and the Ulster Museum (all free entry). Buses back into the City Centre run from Malone Road at the front of the Lanyon Building, or Botanic Avenue behind the Lanyon Building, and can be paid for with contactless methods.

If you would prefer a guided tour of Belfast, the following are available (advanced booking advised):

 is not a dedicated political mural walking tour, but rather a tour of Belfast's varied street art)



How to Get to Belfast by Air, Train and Bus

Belfast City Centre is easily accessible by public transport which the conference organisers strongly encourage participants to use where possible.

By Train

Trains from Dublin Connolly Station terminate in Belfast at Lanyon Place Station which is a 20 minute walk from the Europa Hotel. Alternatively, the Glider G1 Bus runs from outside the train station and takes 12 minutes to College Square East - a two minute walk to the Europa Hotel.

By Bus

Buses from across the island of Ireland terminate at Europa Bus Centre. For those travelling from the Republic of Ireland, this will most likely require a change in Dublin. Please check with your local operator for the best route.

By Air

Belfast has two airports: Belfast City Airport (6 miles from City Centre) and Belfast International Airport (20 miles from City Centre). Airlines flying into Belfast (direct or through other airports) include easyJet, Ryanair, BA, Aer Lingus, KLM, Lufthansa etc. Both airports have buses that run regularly to Europa Bus Centre which is attached to the Europa Hotel. Please bring cash for your bus fare as a contingency. Dublin Airport (100 miles) services a wide range of international flights, and buses run frequently to Europa Bus Centre in Belfast. Advanced booking of your bus journey is advised and can be done via Translink, Dublin Express or Aircoach. Note that there are no train connections from Dublin Airport or either of Belfast's airports.

By Car

If you must travel by car, we strongly encourage carpooling with other conference participants where possible. Please check with Google Maps for the best route.
