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1. Summary

1.1 Location

A site survey was undertaken of a burial cairn at Divis townland, County Antrim, lying just below the road to the television mast. There are a number of other monuments in the Divis area including five other known burial cairns. The survey was the third in a series of planned surveys undertaken by members of the Ulster Archaeological Society during 2011.

1.2 Aims

In order to enhance the archaeological record of this site, the aims of this survey were to produce accurate plan drawings of the monument and carry out a photographic survey. This information was compiled into a report and copies submitted to the Northern Ireland Environment Agency, to the National Trust and to the archives of the Ulster Archaeological Society.

2. Introduction

2.1 Background

The survey of the burial cairn was undertaken on 30th April 2011. It was carried out by members of the Ulster Archaeological Society, in response to a decision taken by the committee of the society to extend an opportunity to members to participate in practical surveys of archaeological monuments that had not previously been recorded. This followed a bequest to the society from the late Dr Ann Hamlin, from which the items of survey equipment were purchased. During discussions with Malachy Conway, Archaeologist of the National Trust in Northern Ireland, it was noted that many archaeological sites on National Trust property had not been subject to a detailed archaeological survey. It was therefore agreed that members of the society would commence a programme to survey these sites and this Divis Burial Cairn (designated number 3) was subsequently chosen to be the 31st of these.

2.2 Previous archaeological surveys

As far as it is known, there has been no previous archaeological survey at this site.




Figure 2: National Trust estate map of Divis property (part of), 2005




Figure 3 1:50,000 Map Sheet 15, 2000 (part of) Ordnance Survey

3. UAS 2011 Survey

3.1 Methodology

It was decided that the survey would take the form of the production of plan drawings and elevations, accompanied by a photographic survey. This report was compiled using the information obtained from these sources, in addition to background documentary material.

3.2 Production of plan drawings

Plan drawings and elevations were completed, using data obtained from the field survey. Measurements were obtained by using a measuring tape and poles. Sketch plans at 1:20 scale were completed on site by recording these measurements on paper on a plane table and

backing up the data on a field notebook for subsequent reference. The field plan was later transferred to a computer-based format for printing.




Figure 4 Plan of site:

3.3 Photographic archive

4. Discussion

The National Trust acquired the land on Divis and Black Mountain in 2004 and the land was opened to the public in 2005. Since then it has been used by a wide range of groups and individuals for walking and recreation, for studying the undisturbed upland habitat and its plants and animals and exploring the archeological landscape.

The survey of this site was part of a wider UAS study of archaeology in the Divis, Black Mountain area.

This monument sits in a valley between the summits of Divis and Black Mountains at altitude of 360 metres above sea level. It is one of a number of monuments in this area where:

a rich and varied archaeological landscape reveals evidence for life and death rituals on the mountain particularly in prehistory. At least four Bronze Age burial cairns are now known along with the site of an earlier megalithic tomb. Prehistoric hut sites survive along with two curious stone walled enclosures, one of which may be early Christian period in date (National Trust 2005).

The monument is best described as a cairn, defined as 'a mound of rough stones built as a memorial or landmark' (Soanes & Hawker 2005, 132). It lies on a site to the east of the road through Divis townland leading to the television mast, past the Barn which is the National Trust Warden's office. There is a view across to the Lagan basin and the Mournes.

A metal post on the access roadway was taken as the reference point. The monument consists of a series of stones of differing sizes placed in an elliptical shape, surrounding a depression in the ground. It is located on a slope in the ground so that the south eastern side is lower than the north western side. The diameter of the cairn is approximately 4.5 metres. The centre of the cairn is approximately 21 metres from the post. The area inside the monument is grass with a small clump of rushes on one side of the depression in the centre. The surrounding area is of rushes and scrub.

This site has probably been robbed out and damaged by cattle.

It is probably from the Bronze Age around 2,500BC to 300BC

Conclusions and Recommendations for further work

This site is easily accessible from the road through the hills. It is recommended that an information board be erected at the site, identifying it as a Bronze Age burial cairn.
